What Happened At P&C? - May 2019

Dear parents and carers,

We had two excellent evening and daytime parent meetings this month. Thanks to those parents and community members who attended. We covered a number of topics:

- NAPLAN: Ms Felicity Wicks, Head Teacher English, and Mr Tom Cordin, Head Teacher Mathematics, provided an overview of the literacy and numeracy components of the NAPLAN test. Year 7 and Year 9 students have been preparing for NAPLAN in their English and Mathematics classes. The tests will again be completed online this year.
- Minimum standards test: Ms Diane Kalinski, Learning and Support Teacher, provided an overview of the NESA minimum standards test. For current Year 11 students, some have pre-qualified for the minimum standard based on their achievement in Year 9 NAPLAN. For students in Year 10 and lower, they will have a separate minimum standards test that will be completed by every student in the future. Overall, students need to meet the minimum standard in literacy and numeracy in order to qualify for an HSC.
- Year 12 BBQ: Year 12 will be running a BBQ for the federal election on Saturday, 18 May 2019. Please come along for your democracy sausage and support Year 12's fundraising efforts.
- **Proposed building upgrade**: The proposed rebuild is still in the planning phase. It is still a proposal and not approved as yet. At the next P&C meeting, further information will be provided on the proposed upgrade to our school.
- Next meetings: The next evening meeting will take place at 6:30pm on Monday, 3 June 2019 and our
 daytime meeting will take place at 9:30am on Thursday, 6 June 2019. These meetings are for us to share
 information with you and we benefit from these meetings just as much as you. Your presence and ideas are
 what we need.






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



A minimum standard of literacy and numeracy is required to receive the HSC from 2020 to reflect the importance of literacy and numeracy for success in daily life.

HSC students will need to meet the HSC minimum standard in three areas – reading, writing and numeracy.

The <u>standard is set</u> at level 3 of the <u>Australian Core Skills Framework (ACSF</u>), which means students will have the basic reading, writing and maths skills needed for everyday tasks and future learning after school. It includes skills for tasks such as:

- following safety instructions in equipment manuals
- understanding a mobile phone plan
- writing a job application
- creating a personal weekly budget.

Literacy and numeracy skills are essential for success in learning and life after school. Together with the <u>NSW Literacy and Numeracy Strategy</u>, the HSC minimum standard is part of an effort to extend the literacy and numeracy focus up into secondary school.

All students, regardless of whether they have met the HSC minimum standard can:

- OStudy HSC courses
- OSit HSC exams and receive HSC exam results
- OGet an ATAR
- OReceive a ROSA, but not the HSC certificate.



How many times can I sit the test?

OStudents can sit for each test twice a year in Year 10, 11 and 12

Preparation for online tests

- Once students have indicated which window, we can then cater to their needs. This will use connect time, with possible withdrawal of necessary students from connect rollcalls for additional preparation. This may include
 - Awareness of the practice questions available online
 - Working in small groups with English or Maths teachers on identified areas of need
 - Enrolment of students in Wordflyers, an online platform that allows for language based drill and practice in an entertaining manner, this also contains NAPLAN style testing. Teachers can also monitor use and assign areas of need.


Students



TEST FORMAT

- Time Allowed: 65 minutes for both Year 7 and Year 9.
- 2 Sections: Short non calculator section followed by a section where calculators can be used in every question. Students are not required to bring their own calculator as it is built into the online test program and can be accessed for every question in this section.
- 3 Levels of Questions: High range, mid range and low range.

A process called "Tailored Testing" is used whereby the test starts out with the same mid range questions for all students and then individually adjusts the difficulty of questions for each student between high, mid and low range.

Writing

- O The three main text types (previously called genres) that are taught are imaginative writing (including narrative writing), informative writing and persuasive writing. In the writing tests, students are provided with a 'writing stimulus' (sometimes called a prompt an idea or topic) and asked to write a response in a particular text type. To date the text types that students have been tested on are narrative writing and persuasive writing. Informative writing is not yet tested by NAPLAN.
- The writing task targets the full range of student capabilities expected of students from Years 3 to 9. The same marking guide is used to assess all students' writing, allowing for a national comparison of student writing capabilities across these year levels.

Reading

- The NAPLAN reading tests measure literacy proficiency across the English learning area in line with the Australian Curriculum: English.
- These tests focus on the reading of written English. Knowledge and interpretation of language conventions in context are also an important part of reading and are drawn upon in many reading questions.
- In the tests, students are provided with a magazine containing a range of texts that illustrate different writing styles. Students read the texts provided then answer related questions in a separate booklet.
- The skills demonstrated in reading are dependent on the complexity and accessibility of the text. Typically students engage with more complex texts as their reading comprehension skills improve. There is a very wide range of reading ability levels at each school year level so the tests start with simple, short texts and get increasingly longer and harder.

Language Conventions

- O The language conventions tests assess spelling, grammar and punctuation. Literacy knowledge and skills are essential to effective communication across all learning areas. However, the tools of language, including language conventions, are explicitly developed in the English learning area. Therefore the content assessed in the language conventions tests is aligned to the Australian Curriculum: English.
- O The language conventions tests focus on the use and knowledge of language conventions in written standard Australian English. These skills are essential to the development of reading and writing. The content of the language conventions tests particularly complements the writing tests where spelling, grammar and punctuation are explicitly assessed in context. However, students' understanding of language conventions is also necessary for reading.

NAPLAN Preparation


- O In English, students have been working on preparing for the tests. In English we have had assessment tasks that mirror the writing forms. For Year 7, this was a persuasive ICT blog post, Year 9 a persuasive ICT task in indigenous perspectives and a language conventions task last week.
- O In English, Year 7 have been working on NAPLAN style questions in conjunction with Term 1 and Term 2 units, and Year 9 have had dedicated 4 weeks of NAPLAN preparation. I also demand that Wordflyers be used at least one lesson/homework a week with both year groups. As the company changed hands this year it did take a while to get our access.
- O All students in Year 7 and Year 9 were given an opportunity to have a NAPLAN practice using the lockdown browser. This was through ACARA, the governing body for the test.

NAPLAN and Wordflyers

- O In English for the past 3 years we have given Year 9 access to Wordflyers. This is an online literacy based website. It has a game type look, but gives students access to text, a summary of grammar / punctuation or spelling element with questions that follow. From this the student gains points, which they can "spend" on inprogram games and items like pineapples etc. The premise is that the students are gaining "stamps" in passport and can buy items for that.
- What is good about it is that we can set or the program can set the student level. In a class each student is on a personal level, and that on the screen a 7.1 student looks exactly like a 7.3 student, so a peer never know their friend is "different" academically then them. Also a teacher by running reports can identify areas a child is struggling with or avoiding and set these as the first activity they have to do on next log on.
- O Students can also do full NAPLAN style texts (without the writing section) that is marked immediately, and they can go back and get help with concept they struggle with.
- On the writing side, that needs a human to mark, but the program provides materials, we print out that scaffold responses, that they teacher can then mark. Both Year 7 and Year 9 have been doing these in class.
- Over the 3 years we have seen an improvement in Year 9 students in grammar, punctuation and spelling over 15%. We attribute this to Wordflyers, so this year we are expanding to Year 7.
